Summary

Appointment

Jaimie Adam of Above Quota Elections Pty Ltd was appointed Returning Officer for the University of Melbourne Annual Student Election on 20th June 2018. Stephen Luntz and Haydn Steel, also of AQE, were appointed Deputy Returning Officers. Above Quota Elections would like to express its appreciation, not only for being appointed once again, but for the early timing of the appointment. Although the IT issues experienced in 2017 were much diminished this year, it is still very helpful for the incoming Returning Officers to be able to give plenty of prior notice to those arms of the university we need to engage with prior to needing their assistance.

The Electoral Tribunal at the time of the appointment consisted of Mr Michael Gronow and Mr Peter Lithgow. Professor Belinda Fehlberg joined the tribunal during the course of the election.

Electoral Regulation Changes

The changes to the election regulations drafted last year, but passed too late to apply to the 2017 election, came into force this year. In general, we regard these as having been a success. Most crucially, the abolition of Group Voting Tickets prevented the undermining of democracy that has sometimes occurred in past years without creating any new problems. It also avoided the danger that of some ballots being so overloaded with front tickets they became impossible to keep readable while still being printed on A4 paper. This is something we have come close to in recent years.

In addition, the abolition of the regulation requiring Queer Officer, Committee and Council Representative to be distributed separately from the main pack contributed, along with AQE's success in finding a cheaper printer, to a reduction of almost \$4,000 on the printing budget – a saving that comes directly to UMSU rather than AQE.

Nominations

Nominations opened on Monday 23rd July for positions on the following bodies:

- University of Melbourne Student Union (UMSU), including office-bearers, Students' Council and all committees (including Southbank and Burnley)
- Melbourne University University Council (Student Representative)
- UMSU by-elections to fill several positions for the remainder of 2018
- Delegation to the National Union of Students (NUS)

The notice of election appears on page 13. This notice was posted in Union House and on the elections website, and a short version, containing a link to the website, was also e-mailed to all students.

Nominations closed at midday on Friday 10th August. From the Returning Officer's perspective even fewer problems with the online nomination system were experienced than in the previous two years. It is possible that this was a result of the addition of the section allowing nominees running on tickets to include the email of the registering officer.

A substantial number of candidates submitted their nominations more than once, apparently not being convinced the first nomination had registered. However, while this made for a marginal increase in processing work, it seems the much more important danger, where a nomination actually does not go through, did not occur.

As in 2017, a substantial number of nominations were received from candidates who apparently made no attempt to campaign. Unsurprisingly, none of these candidates got close to winning, but did add somewhat to the cost of running the election. One of these individuals contacted the Returning Officer team after the announcement of nominations to ask if this was an election or if they would be interviewed by a panel for positions. It's not clear what can be done to improve understanding, particularly among first year students, of the nature of the election prior to people nominating, but ideas would be welcome.

A total of 345 nominations were received (all using the electronic system), compared with 398 in 2017 and 417 in 2016. Unlike in past years, no attempts were made to submit nominations after the deadline. Two nominations contained errors, but these were deemed sufficiently minor for the Returning Officer to allow them to be corrected after the close, in one case taking into account the fact that no one else had nominated for the position in question, and therefore would have been disadvantaged by this decision. On the other hand four nominations were rejected, one because the individual was on leave of absence, two because they attempted to run alone for Media Officer, which requires a minimum of three candidates, and the last because, as a Parkville student, the nominator was not eligible to run for Burnley committee.

All candidates were notified by e-mail of the receipt of their nominations; one of the advantages of the electronic system was that this process happens automatically.

In addition to their usual role in producing an election guide, and offering photography services for this, the Media Officers hosted a debate between the presidential candidates. Unfortunately, none of the Returning Officer team was able to attend this, but it appears no problems were encountered, and in principle this is an initiative we would encourage for future.

The complete list of nominees appears on page 17, in ballot paper order where applicable. The draw for ballot paper positions was conducted on Monday 13th August. Despite requests from the Returning Officer, no scurtineers attended at all, the first time this has occurred. Although we appreciate the confidence in the integrity of the Returning Officers this implies, we regard the absence of scrutineers as somewhat worrying, and will consider ways to address this in future.

Tickets

Applications for ticket registration also closed at midday on Friday 10 August. An information session for prospective tickets was held on Wednesday August 1 to inform organisers of the requirements.

Seven applications were received, all of which were found to be eligible, compared to 15 in 2017 and 17 in 2016. Candidates also nominated indicating they wished to run on two other tickets, but no registration forms were received for these two names, so the candidates were listed on the ballot paper without a ticket. We attribute the reduction to the abolition of Group Voting Tickets, and the consequent loss of incentive to create feeder tickets.

Withdrawals

The following candidates withdrew their nominations prior to the printing of ballot papers:

Although a number of candidates ran for multiple positions which cannot be held simultaneously, none of these came close to winning. Unlike in past years, the major tickets, which dominated the successful outcomes did not generally run candidates for more positions than they could hold, preventing the need for conflict of position forms in many cases.

Polling

Polling took place during the week of Monday 3 September to Friday 7 September, at the following times and locations:

This notice was posted on the website and advertised to all students. The experiment with late polling at Baillieu on Friday was abandoned, but hours were extended at FBE relative to 2017, in addition to the two new polling places.

Turnout for the week was 3619, a small increase over the last two years. The anomalous nature of the lower turnout in 2015 has been confirmed. That year aside, turnout has been remarkably consistent in recent years.

The opening of Stop 1 did little to reduce the problem of too many votes being cast at the Baillieu for the space there. Although we endorse continuing polling at Stop 1, it seems further action will need to be taken if the overcrowding at the Baillieu is to be addressed.

Voting figures from the polling registers were checked each evening against the total of ballot papers issued, and both were checked against the physical count after the close of polling. All totals reconciled within acceptable margins of error. The table on page 30 summarizes the turnout at all polling stations.

Storage of Ballot Papers

By arrangement with the University, unused ballot papers and live ballot papers from the Parkville polling stations were stored in a secure location in the Raymond Priestly Building each evening. Ballot papers for the VCA and Burnley polling places were stored securely by AQE staff, then returned to Parkville on and Thursday.

In all cases, scrutineers were invited to witness the sealing and unsealing of ballot boxes and the transfer of votes into storage, although in some cases no campaigners were present to act as scrutineers.

Electronic Roll and Provisional Voting

Wireless database access to the electronic roll was used at all polling stations. The electronic version of the roll provided by the Melbourne University IT department was used once again. There were problems for the Returning Officer team in establishing who we should be liaising with for this to be established, and how information was to be transferred, but once these were resolved the university staff were very helpful. The roll worked very smoothly this year, and the one problem experienced last year was not encountered again.

A set of laptops was provided for use by poll clerks by the University Services. The fact that these were so much lighter than previously, and had much longer lasting batteries, was greatly appreciated, and avoided what could have been serious problems when the powerpoint at the Baillieu was found not to be working.

Despite experiencing no drop outs, there was an increased number of provisional votes this year, with 30 in the end. Of these, an unusually high 17 were accepted.

Postal Votes

Applications for postal votes closed at 5pm on Wednesday 31 August. No applications were received.

Complaints and Appeals

As is always the case, many complaints were received during the election. The majority of these related to minor matters, and attracted only warnings, even where the truth could be verified. However, this year also saw the circulation of a message including some very serious allegations by a person who was not a member of, but had strong friendship links to, one of the tickets. There were also allegations of intimidation by one candidate that went beyond those usually seen.

The intimidation allegations were eventually resolved through an agreement between the tickets. We would like to commend the leadership of both major tickets for the way they handled that particular issue.

The circulated message, along with various breaches of the integrity of the non-campaigning area, drew penalties from the Returning Officers. These were heavier than in recent years, reflecting what we saw as the more serious nature of the breaches, but much lighter than those applied a decade or so ago, when serious breaches were more common.

An appeal was received requesting the result for General Secretary and Women's Officers be overturned on the basis that some of the penalties applied had been disproportionate. Given the closeness of the margins in these cases, it was argued that these penalties could have affected the outcome. The appeal was dismissed, with the electoral tribunal ruling that the penalties imposed were not disproportionate.

For the purposes of the appeal, the Returning Officers were requested to provide a full list of all penalties applied. In most years we do not record all minor penalties in the report, but having collected them in this case, they are included in the Appendix, along with the tribunal's ruling on the appeal.

Lockup and Counting

Counting began at midday on Friday 7th September, five hours before the close of polling. A lockup was again instituted, in which scrutineers were permitted to observe the early counting but not to leave or communicate with outside prior to 5pm. The lockup again proceeded smoothly and without incident, largely due to the assistance of former Returning Officer Charles Richardson, who came out of retirement to assist.

The majority of the office-bearer counts were declared on the Friday night, with others done early on the Saturday. However, two positions; Welfare Officer and General Secretary were easily close enough that the provisional votes could have made the difference, delaying declaration. Indeed, the eventual winner of Welfare Officer was not the one leading prior to the addition of provisional votes, most of which could not be added until Monday September 10. Although the margin for Women's Officer was greater than the number of provisional votes, it was still close enough that a recount was requested and conducted after the provisional votes had been added. Recounts for these were conducted on September 10 and 11th. A second recount was conducted of Welfare Officer as well.

Counting continued all day Saturday and for six hours on Sunday. Aside from the office bearer recounts, four committees remained to be completed at the end of Sunday, being Disabilities Committee, Education Committee, Environment Committee and Queer Committee. These were all completed on Monday the 10th. The margins for the final positions on Disabilities and Queer Committee were exceptionally close – a fraction of a vote in the case of Queer Committee. However, no requests for recounts were received on these.

As has been the case for many years, the count was conducted on the second floor of the Union Building, with the rooms locked so that only Union Security had access. Returning Officer staff needed to request access at the start of each day. Unfortunately, on the morning of Monday the 10th, the security guard on duty unlocked the room where counting was occurring, well before any staff arrived to continue the count. It is clear there was no ill-intent in this case, the guard had simply forgotten that the room needed to be kept locked and acted on autopilot, since unlocking the rooms is part of the job the rest of the year.

In years when all office bearer and council counts had been completed by this point, such a breach of security would not be an issue, but with several highly prized positions outstanding, there was understandable concern at the possibility of ballot tampering. However, there is no evidence that this occurred, and considerable signs that it did not. Not only were the counts conducted before and after the room was left open within normal margins of variation, but the ballots had clearly not been displaced. Ballot numbers before and afterwards were identical – making clear no votes had been removed. The votes for General Secretary, the highest profile of the positions to be recounted, had votes distributed in multiple smaller piles based on presidential vote (the President and General Secretary ballots were on the same sheet of paper) and it would have been hard to tamper with these in ways that would not have been detectible by the counters.

Nevertheless, this event aroused justifiable concern. After this, all office bearer positions under question were kept in locked boxes inside the count room overnight, so even if the room was left open again they could not be accessed. Consideration should be given in future as to how to avoid a repetition of this situation in years where some contentious positions are very close.

The full provisional declaration of results was issued on September 14. This notice appears on page 31, and was also posted in Union House and on the elections website. The period for appeals against the results or requests for recounts, other than Clubs and Societies Committee, expired three working days later, on 19th September.

Full details of the count for each position appear in the Appendix. In addition, the count for President is broken down by day and by polling station.

The total valid vote of 1606 represents approximately 7% of eligible voters.

Clubs & Societies Committee

The Clubs & Societies Committee is elected separately by the Clubs & Societies Council rather than by students at large. Management of that election has again been included as part of the contract for the annual election. The Clubs & Societies Council met on Tuesday October 9 and the Returning Officer services were provided by Stephen Luntz and Bianca Dickson, with ballots once again designed by Bek Saltmarsh. Results have been published with the other positions.

Acknowledgements

Recommendations

1. Clarification of Section 21

We welcome the decision, after many years, to abolish Group Voting Tickets, bringing voting for Council and the Committees in line with the reformed Senate rules. Unfortunately, however, the manner in which this has been done created a contradiction. We described this in our initial ruling.

Due to inconsistencies in the Electoral Regulations regarding Statements of Distribution of Preferences, or Group Voting Tickets (GVTs), the Returning Officer rules the following:

That with regards to GVTs the recent amendment to the Electoral Regulations, Clause 21.2, will take precedence over all other clauses.

Clause 21.2 states that 'there shall be no system of automatic preference distribution' from GVTs. However, the balance of Clause 21 sets out how GVTs may be lodged and will be dealt with. In order to resolve this contradiction, and to reflect the intention of the most recent amendment, outside of 21.2 the remainder of Clause 21 is now ruled to be redundant.

Additionally, Clause 25.3 provides for a GVT preference flow in the event that all candidates of one ticket are withdrawn. So long as a ticket has at least one candidate 25.3 is irrelevant. However, in the event that all candidates from a ticket withdraw, 25.3 is contradictory to 21.2.

In order to resolve this contradiction Clause 25.3 is now ruled to be redundant as it is clear that the current intention is to remove all ticket-directed preference flows.

Therefore, GVTs will not be accepted, published or applied during the count.

Although we consider our decision the best way to handle the situation, it is clearly highly undesirable to have clauses in the regulations that directly contradict each other. Had a ticket run, submitted a GVT and then withdrawn all its candidates, they would have had an arguable case that the GVT should be respected, creating great confusion and multiple distortions of democracy.

Removal of 25.3 would clear up the most concerning aspects of the contradiction, but ideally we would recommend that all of clause 21 other than 21.2 should be taken out.

2. Length of Policy Statements

Owing to renumbering of sections of the regulations, the regulations, as they now stand, allow for 300 word statements for candidates for voting positions on student council, and 100 for office bearers and committees. We are quite confident this was never the intent. It has always been the case that office-bearer candidates had the option of longer statements. It may be considered desirable to give candidates for student council more words than candidates for committees, but certainly not than office bearers.

For this election we abided by what we are confident was the intent of the regulations – reflected in the

fact that most candidates put in statements of the appropriate length. Nevertheless, this error should be rectified lest it be challenged and create chaos in the production of the election guide.

3. Authorization rules

The changes made to the authorization of online material, made at our suggestion, improved this section, but not as much as we hoped. Most candidates appeared to still be under the belief that they could not post things online until they had approval from a member of the Returning Officer team, creating vastly more work for us, and delays for them.

Some of this is no doubt hold-over from previous elections, and will improve with time. However, it became clear that some of those who were confused had not run previously. On consideration we suspect their misunderstanding stemmed from the wording, "Authorized by the Returning Officer."

It is our view that this should be changed to "Registered with the Returning Officer". This would more accurately reflect the reality, and may help with the confusion, both on how to submit, and to whether items that turn out to breach the regulations can subsequently be withdrawn.

4. Reference to polling place at Murrup Barak in the Constitution

This section is worded so ambiguously it could be interpreted in three different ways. One of these would mean that votes could not be cast for Indigenous Officer, Committee or Student Council representative other than Murrup Barak. Since only around half the votes cast for Indigenous Officer were cast at this polling place this year, such an interpretation would drastically reduce participation, unless the hours at MB were enormously extended, at considerable cost.

We do not believe this is the intent, and while we acknowledge changing the constitution is much harder than the regulations, recommend this section be modified at the next convenient opportunity.

5. Timing of Declaration

The Electoral Tribunal has ruled that, under regulation 47.2 none of the positions in the election can be finally declared until the entire election, including Clubs and Societies Council, is complete and this report has been submitted. Concern was expressed to us that some of the office bearers need to engage in activities prior to formally taking up their roles, particularly the inclusion of President and Student Representative on University Council, and this should not be delayed while waiting for Clubs Council. Considering that in some years the election of C&S council has occurred even later than this year, this could become an even more troublesome issue in future years.

We recommend the regulations be changed so that final declaration of some positions can occur, where appropriate, while others remain to be finalized.

6. Photography of Ballots

At one time the regulations used had a specific clause banning the photographing of ballot papers. We are not sure when, let alone why, this was removed, but consider it a mistake. Although several clauses in the regulations can be interpreted as banning photography, and a penalty was imposed when a candidate was caught engaging in this (unfortunately increasingly common) practice, an explicit ban would reduce the risk of candidates at least repeating the mistake.

7. Complexity of election

As we noted last year the addition of extra positions comes at a cost, not only financially but in terms of democracy. In running the election for Deakin University Student Association this year it was noticeable that turnout was almost as high as at UMSU, despite far shorter polling hours and an apparently less engaged electorate. We believe the difference was the much smaller number of positions for which people could vote, making the process far shorter.

Melbourne is not likely to adopt Deakin's structure, and we do not suggest it should. However, a reduction in the number of positions to elect would be likely to increase turnout. The most obvious candidates for this are the special representatives on Students Council, followed by some of the committees.

It is clear many of the Office Bearer positions added in recent years are doing good work and benefit the Union and University community. It is less clear to us that the same is true for their committees, with anecdotal accounts of teams struggling to find candidates, particularly those who are keen to engage. Combining some committees so that several office bearers are accountable to a single committee could have multiple benefits, and should be considered.

8. Reference to University Council

Concern was expressed to us by a staff member in the University Secretariat at the reference to election of a student to University Council, as this was seen as implying such an election would occur every year. In fact, it happens every second year. Although we are not convinced the clause will be read in this way, there seems no harm in modifying the reference to note that this will not happen every year.

9. Claims of Achievement and Democracy for International Students

We reiterate our statements on these points from 2017, since they have not been addressed.

9.1 Claims of Achievement

Tickets have been increasingly keen to claim credit for past achievements and initiatives in the student union. On the one hand, this is encouraging, suggesting that the Union's record is regarded as being positive and that candidates want to associate themselves with it. On the other hand, there is a concern that voters are being misled over tickets' actual records of performance. In the past the Returning Officers have worked on the basis that such claims should be allowed unless there was clear evidence against them, while the burden of proof was upon a complainant.

However, as time has gone on some of the claims have become larger and more doubtful. In this context, consideration should be given to more rigorous checking. Unfortunately, most of the claims relate to matters occurring during the year whilst the Returning Officers are not on campus, and are thus in no position to assess the validity of claims come election time. Clearly it is also not possible to rely on the word of current or former office bearers, who usually have a stake in the outcome.

We are able to suggest two alternative or concurrent options to improve this developing problem.

- Staff can be consulted on questions of historical fact, but this may place individuals in a somewhat compromising position. One possibility to share responsibility is the establishment of a committee of long-standing staff and management, with a minimum of three members, to whom the Returning Officer could refer questions of historical dispute.
- Reversing the onus of proof, so that a ticket or candidate claiming credit or credit by association would be obliged to provide substantiation to the Returning Officer before their publicity was authorised.

9.2 Democracy for International Students

It is disappointing to see that no move has been made to address the point that we flagged two years ago as a "top priority", namely the provisions that exempt the International Students Department from the operation of the UMSU Electoral Regulations.

As we said on that occasion, "These provisions lack any reasonable justification. The rules that govern all other UMSU elections are designed to guarantee fairness, transparency and due process. If those are desirable goals (and we believe they are), they should apply across the board."

It cannot be stressed too strongly that autonomy or self-government provides no argument for an exemption from democracy. It is also worth noting that integration of the International Students Department into UMSU elections could lead to a significant cost saving.

It is recommended that revision of sections 152.1 (i) and (j) and 154 of the Constitution along these lines should be treated as a matter of some urgency.

Notice is hereby given that nominations will open at 12 midday on Monday 23rd July, for the 2018 University of Melbourne Annual Student Election.

Positions to be filled at the election include:

1. Office-bearers, committees and Students' Council of the University of Melbourne Student Union (UMSU), including

the Burnley Student Department and the Victorian College of the Arts Department

2. A student fellow of the University Council

3. Delegates to the National Union of Students (NUS)

4. Several vacant positions to be filled by by-election for the remainder of 2018

A complete list of positions appears at the end of this notice.

Nominations close at 12 midday on Friday 10th August.

Polling will take place from Monday 3rd September until Friday 7th September (inclusive). **All students are eligible to vote**. A detailed schedule of polling times and locations will be posted after close of nominations. Students may also vote by post – applications for postal votes close at 5pm on Wednesday 31st August.

Tickets: Any fifteen (15) students may register a ticket to run in the election by filling in the appropriate form. Applications for Ticket Registration open and close at the same time as nominations. It is not necessary to be on a ticket to run in the election.

Tickets that are running candidates for multi-member positions should also submit a form showing the order in which they wish their candidates to appear. Candidates running for positions that cannot be held concurrently should submit a form showing which positions they wish to hold in case of a conflict. Ticket registration forms, candidate order forms and conflict of position forms must all be submitted by close of nominations. All forms are available from the Returning Officer or can be downloaded from the election website (see below).

Policy speeches: Candidates may also, with their nominations, submit policy statements for publication in Farrago and on the election website. Policy statements must not exceed 300 words for UMSU office-bearer positions or 100 words for all other positions. A photo session for office-bearer candidates will be organized after close of nominations.

Please note that **all deadlines are strict** and cannot be extended. Candidates are strongly urged to lodge their forms well before the deadlines. Nominations should be submitted at http://union.unimelb.edu.au/elections. All other forms should be delivered personally to the Returning Officer or an authorised electoral official. (The Election Office on the 3rd floor of Union House will be open extensively throughout the election period, and appointments can be made by phone or email.) Where this is not practicable, please contact the Returning Officer to make other arrangements. Do not post forms without prior arrangement, as no responsibility will be taken for late or lost forms under

those circumstances. It is not possible to accept faxed or emailed forms.

Restrictions on election

Any student may nominate for any position unless otherwise specified below.

The position of Media Officers must be held jointly by teams of three or four candidates. All other officer positions, except for President and General Secretary, may be held either individually or by two candidates jointly. Candidates who are running as a team should each fill out a nomination form and submit them stapled together, with a single policy statement.

If more than one person holds the office of Women's Officer, one of them must be a Woman of Colour.

For all other committees, including the Burnley and VCA Committees and the general members of Students' Council (but not the NUS delegation), at least half of the members (ignoring remainders) must be women, provided there are sufficient female candidates.

Candidates for Queer Officer, Queer Representative on Students' Council and Queer Committee must be Queer students. (See Regulation 32.4 for further detail.) If more than one person holds the office of Queer Officer, one of them must be a Woman or Trans.

If more than one person holds any other office, one of them must be a Woman.

Candidates for Indigenous Officer, Indigenous Representative on Students' Council and Indigenous Committee must be Indigenous students.

Candidates for Disabilities Officer, Disabilities Committee and the Disability Representative on Students' Council must be students with disabilities.

Candidates for International Representative on Students' Council must be International students. Candidates for Graduate Representative on Students' Council must be Graduate students.

Candidates for the Burnley positions must be enrolled at the Burnley campus. Candidates for the VCA positions must be students of the Faculty of the VCA and Music.

No person can stand for election if they are employed half-time or more by UMSU, the University, MU Student Union Ltd or related bodies, or any combination thereof. In the case of the University Council position that includes any casual employment with the University. No person can stand for an office-bearer position if they have already served two terms of office as an office-bearer. For further information on eligibility to stand and to vote in the election, please consult the Election

Regulations, available at the UMSU Office and on the election website. Copies of the Regulations can also be obtained at the Election Office, where further enquiries are welcome.

Appendix 1

List of Campaigning Bans Imposed During The Week.

Monday:

"Barry" from More! For four hours for campaigning within the polling area at the FBE. Molly Willmot from Stand Up! For two hours as a result of an individual handing out Stand Up! leaflets on the ground floor of the Union Building. The ban was placed on Molly as the ticket registrar, as it appeared the individual breaking the rule was there to hand out leaflets for another event, and was taking the opportunity to hand out for Stand Up! at the same time. Since he was not a regular campaigner, banning him would have been pointless, so the penalty fell on the registering officer.

Tuesday:

None that we can recall.

Wednesday:

None that we can recall.

Thursday:

Molly Willmott from Stand Up! for one hour for shouting at a More! Campaigner. Molly Willmott from Stand Up! for four hours, subsequently reduced to two, for

photographing her ballot paper and posting it on Instagram. Reduced because the explicit clause banning photography is no longer in the regulations.

Callum Simpsom from More! for two hours for posting a misleading statement about his opposition on social media.

Friday:

A one hour ticket ban on More! because of a candidate caught campaigning inside the polling area.

Four campaigners from More! for two hours for the highly inaccurate and damaging message sent out by a More! supporter.

Ban for the rest of the day on an individual campaigner for Melbourne Socialists for campaigning in the voting area.

A half hour ticket ban on More! as a combined penalty, both for Office Bearers who had not taken leave of absence campaigning for More!, and because of a recognition that the individual creating the damaging message was more closely aligned with More! than previously realised.

General Secretary Appeal:

I am making this appeal on four grounds. These are:

Firstly, that the campaigning bans given out by the Returning Officers during the week (as under regulation

4.1.6.2.) were inequitably distributed in a manner which unfairly benefitted the ticket Stand Up! and disadvantaged the ticket More!, which calls the razor-thin margin of four votes determining General Secretary into question.

Although it is difficult to establish unfair and incommensurate treatment of More! until I have acquired a record of penalties delivered by the Returning Officers during the week, I would like to highlight three specific examples:

1. On the Monday of the election week (the 3rd of September), a person associated with Stand Up! was caught handing out Stand Up! flyers inside Union House, where campaigning is prohibited. Moreover, this person was using notices of an UMSU-affiliated club AGM to hide the flyers, handing these out to students with the flyers inside. This student was caught in the act by a Returning Officer. My understanding is that the penalty for this act was a two-hour ban for one Stand Up! campaigner (a high-profile candidate), and either a day or a week ban for the person caught flying. As the person who was distributing flyer inside Union House was *not* a Stand Up! campaigner, but rather a person only associated with the ticket, the latter ban was inconsequential.

Conversely, on the Friday of the election week (the 7th of September), a More! campaigner was caught handing out More! flyers inside Union House. As a result, the More! ticket was given a full ticket ban on campaigning for the period of one hour. While I recognise that this was done by a More! campaigner as opposed to a person simply affiliated with the ticket, and in addition to a ban given to a More! campaigner on Monday for speaking to a friend in casual and private conversation about More! within a polling area, the punishment remains completely disproportionate to that given to Stand Up! and represents a dramatic escalation of penalties.

These penalties are grossly disproportionate: one campaigner being banned for two hours in comparison to the entire ticket (at least 40 campaigners) for one hour. I do not believe the facts of the violations warranted such a disproportionate penalty, especially considering the level of deception shown in the act of Stand Up! flyers being distributed secretly inside other unrelated materials.

I would also like to note that the More! campaigner did not do this sanctioned by the coordinators or any other authority figure in More! and acted alone. To me, it seems like a more appropriate penalty in the context of the prior Stand Up! penalty to have given a day-long ban for the campaigner who committed the offence plus perhaps an additional penalty for a coordinator or high-profile candidate as in the Stand Up! penalty. Regardless, the drastic escalation of penalties from banning one campaigner to banning the entire ticket over fundamentally similar breaches of the Electoral Regulations seems to clearly benefit Stand Up! and unfairly disadvantage More! and would thus constitute a defect in the conduct of the election.

2. On the Friday of the election week, a message was circulated on social media by someone who was not a member of More! but had friends who were members of More!. This message was defamatory in nature, making accusations against the tickets Stand Up! and Melbourne Socialists. In response to the message and the potential advantage it could confer upon More!, four More! campaigners were randomly selected to be banned for two hours from 12 until 2, including a ticket coordinator. The message was not circulated widely, and very few people knew about the message or its contents, so it strains belief that it could have rendered a great advantage to More!. We were told that the ban was to cancel out the advantage gained by the message - however, it seems nearly impossible that this message could have translated to the number of votes four campaigners could win over the course of two hours, particularly at the busiest time of day on campus.

At the end of the two-hour ban for these campaigners, we were then told that the Returning Officers were considering a second ban. At 2pm, the Returning Officers decided to ban us for an entire hour, due to the sender of the message having admitted 'political motivations' for sending the message. Again, we were told that this ban was to correct for the unfair advantage given to More! by the message being sent. Since we had already received a penalty for the message, it seems clear that it was now the motivation that was impacting on the severity of the penalty. It is not clear to me how the motivation of the sender affects the outcome of the message in terms of potential votes affected, and the number of potential votes affected had been the motivation for applying a campaigning ban. After some debate, the ban was reduced to 30 minutes for the entire ticket. It is my opinion that a 30-minute ban from 2.15-2.45pm, a peak time for voters, would bring about a significant loss of votes and could certainly have brought more votes than the 4 that decided General Secretary. Furthermore, it is our understanding that the ban was not agreed on by consensus amongst the Returning Officers, being enforced by a 2-1 vote, indicating that at least one Returning Officer felt it was an egregious penalty. The message in question was far from widespread. It was not shared to any groups that Morel is aware of but rather to a small number of that person's friends in private messages, one of which was later shown to a Stand Up! campaigner. It seems impossible that any individual social media messaging by a single student, regardless of content, could possibly have produced enough votes for us to be equal to the significant, lengthy, and widespread campaign penalties that were applied because of it. Thus, I believe this constitutes an unfairly harsh penalty placed upon More!, and thus a defect in the conduct of the election which, in light of the small margin in question, materially affected the outcome of the election.

By comparison, defamatory posters were displayed in multiple locations throughout the election week, explicitly accusing a candidate from Morel of "hanging out with right-wing racists", and while an appeal was lodged against the title of the poster, no response was received from the Returning Officers, even after an appeal was sent in writing to Stephen Luntz. Although the appellant in that case had called Luntz with the complaint and received assurance that the appeal would be discussed and heard by the Returning Officers and an appeal could also be sent in writing to strengthen their case, neither the appellant nor More! heard back from the Returning Officers, much less saw the posters removed or altered. The same accusations as displayed on the posters were also repeated on the ground, during campaigning. Similarly, More! submitted a complaint to the Returning Officers on the Tuesday night of election week regarding the Stand Up! how-to-vote flyer taking credit for an achievement of a member of More!. A ticket taking undue credit in campaigning is a standard complaint submitted to the Returning Officers and should have been investigated fully. The More! ticket was told the matter would be investigated but to our knowledge, no investigation ever took place and no further correspondence was received from the Returning Officers regarding this matter.

I believe these instances demonstrate a lack of consideration of grievances lodged by candidates from Morel, and an unfair prioritisation of certain complaints (such as the defamatory social media message discussed prior) over others. This would constitute a defect in the conduct of the election, and again, in light of the small margin in question, it is perfectly plausible to conclude at least four voters may have been swayed by the posters or how-to-vote flyers in question and thus the lack of action on the Returning Officers' part would have materially affected the outcome of the election.

3. On the Monday of the election week, Molly Willmott, the Stand Up! presidential candidate, was reported for filming her own ballot inside the polling booth, precisely in order to show her marking a '1' next to her own name. This video was shared to her Instagram account and reported by More!. Willmott received a two-hour campaigning ban for this, which was subsequently reduced to thirty minutes if she produced a 1000-word essay on the importance of ballot secrecy for the Returning Officers. At no point during the week did a More! campaigner receive this option for alternative sanctions in lieu of a ban, even for those with relatively small offences. Some More! campaigners were given essay-based punishments in *addition* to a ban. We believe that this is a

clear example of inconsistent application of the Electoral Regulations, which materially benefitted Stand Up! to the tune of 90 minutes extra campaigning time for a high-profile campaigner and thus calls the result for General Secretary into question.

As General Secretary was declared by a margin of four votes out of approximately 3000 cast, I believe that it is very clear that these votes could have either been acquired by Morel during the times of the overly harsh campaigning bans or lost by Stand Up! had their bans had been equally harsh. I have unfortunately not yet received requested documentation from the Returning Officers regarding decisions made throughout election week. However, upon acquisition of such records I believe I will be able to more precisely show a pattern of inequitable application of regulations which have unfairly affected More!, and directly affected the election to a point which the position of General Secretary would have been provisionally declared for More! had correct and equitable sanctions been applied to both tickets.

Secondly, there exists at least 5 disputed ballots that were included in the final count as votes for the Stand Up! General Secretary candidate Reece Moir. Some of these ballots - I am not sure of the precise number - were included under the approval of a majority of the three Returning Officers with one Returning Officer dissenting. If these ballots were not included, this would have changed the result. I would like these disputed ballots to be formally reviewed, especially given that on some the Returning Officers were divided.

Thirdly, that the Returning Officers authorised campaigning material for 'Stand Up!' which was misleading and dishonest. Specifically, on the 26th of August the candidate Reece Moir posted a document entitled 'General Secretary Policy' on the Facebook page 'Reece for General Secretary - Vote 1 Stand Up' which contained a small quantity of material plagiarised from my own candidate statement, as submitted to the Returning Officers with my nomination for General Secretary by the 10th of August, and paraphrased by myself in a Facebook post on the page 'More for UMSU' on the 19th of August. The latter is how I believe Moir came across the statement. Evidence of this plagiarism is attached, as part of my initial correspondence with the Returning Officers. I submit that material plagiarised from an opponent falls under either 43.1 as 'dishonest conduct' or 27.3 as 'misleading or deceptive' and thus should not have been authorised.

I submit that any explanation for this authorisation shows a defect in the conduct of the election. Personally, I do believe that a failure to check that Moir's campaigning material did not plagiarise from another candidate for the exact same position before granting authorisation is a failure of due diligence on the part of the Returning Officers. Regardless, I did report it to the Returning Officers on the next day, the 27th of August. The response I received from the Returning Officers was that firstly, plagiarism is a grey area under the Electoral Regulations, secondly, that Moir's plagiarism may not be of sufficient quantity to reach the threshold, and thirdly, that they would have to discuss it amongst themselves to come to any conclusion.

On the first count, I do believe that plagiarism in campaigning material should be considered dishonest, misleading, and/or deceptive. I believe it is clearly dishonest to present the work of another candidate as your own. While it is of course not against regulations to have the same policies as another candidate, potential voters who read the 'General Secretary Policy' in question would leave with the incorrect impression that these were Moir's original policies, and perhaps if those candidates later saw my own statements without checking dates they would be misled into believing my own character is such that I would plagiarise Moir's work.

On the second count, I believe even this small quantity of plagiarism falls under the category of dishonest, misleading and/or deceptive as the University's Academic Integrity Policy (section 5.54c) specifically refers to even "minor copying of material, such as copying up to a few sentences" as a breach of (academic) integrity. This Policy of course does not directly govern the conduct of UMSU elections, but it binds all University students and while the UMSU regulations, policies, and Constitution are silent on this issue I believe it is reasonable to look to the University's own policies.

On the third count, no action was subsequently taken and the document still contains the plagiarised material as of today, the 12th of September. Additionally, I never heard back about any conclusion reached in any discussion of the regulations regarding plagiarism, despite requesting to be updated following such a discussion. I have attached my correspondence with the Returning Officers regarding this matter.

I have outlined why I believe plagiarism generally, and this instance specifically, is banned under the Electoral Regulations. Thus, I believe that if what Moir published should indeed be considered dishonest, misleading, and/or deceptive, then the Returning Officers have inconsistently applied punishments for violations of the Electoral Regulations by issuing no punishment, benefitting the ticket Stand Up! Generally and the candidate Reece Moir specifically. That this material was allowed to stand I thus believe shows a defect in the conduct of the election.

I also believe this defect materially affected the result. The Facebook page 'Reece for General Secretary -Vote 1 Stand Up' has received 148 likes as of the 12th of September. The document in question, 'General Secretary Policy', is the first post a visitor to the page would view. The page itself was widely shared. It was shared twice (on the 1st and 3rd of September) on the page 'Stand Up For UMSU', which has 1097 likes as of the 12th of September. Moir also invited an unknown quantity of people to engage with the page - I and a number of other More! candidates and campaigners also received an invitation to like the page, which shows that Moir and Stand Up! wanted to share the page outside Stand Up! circles and convince voters who might be unsure or voting for other candidates. I believe that at least four votes (out of the hundreds who have seen the page and the document) could have been affected by this, which would have materially affected the result of the election, given that it was decided by four votes.

Finally, the room containing the ballot papers was unintentionally left unlocked and unattended for several

hours on the morning of the 10th of September. I would like to note firstly that I do not have any substantive

evidence that tampering has occurred. However, the extremely small size of the margin by which the election was decided does make such tampering a distinct possibility as it would be a simple matter to locate and alter a minimum of five ballot papers. I would like this to be fully investigated before the result is allowed to stand.

To conclude, I would like to restate my belief that these grounds both individually and taken as a whole constitute defects in the conduct of the election, and given the position of General Secretary was only declared for Stand Up! by four votes, would have materially affected the result of the election. I believe in the absence of these defects the election of General Secretary would have been provisionally declared for More!, and I would like to thank the Electoral Tribunal for hearing my case. If further information or documentation would be desirable, I would of course be happy to supply it to the Tribunal.

Response of the Returning Officer to lodged Appeals

The appeals lodged against the result of the Women's Officer and General Secretary contain several errors of fact, that we consider to be materially important in determining whether the More ticket was unfairly disadvantaged:

• With respect to penalties imposed for leafleting in Union House, More has asserted that both campaigners were candidates. This is incorrect. The Stand Up campaigner was not a candidate, the More campaigner admitted to being a committee candidate.

The Stand Up campaigner was caught leafleting at the foot of the main staircase in Union House. The More candidate was caught campaigning in the Union House Lounge where the main polling booth is located.

Stand Up received a two hour campaigning ban imposed upon their ticket

registrant/Presidential candidate.

More received a ticket ban as it was the second time for the week that a More candidate was caught campaigning in a polling area.

On Monday 3/9, a More candidate was seen and heard campaigning to a student, who was about to vote, directly in front of the issuing table at the FBE. This was witnessed by the Returning Officer. The candidate's direction to vote for More was clearly audible to anyone in the polling area. It was not a private nor casual conversation. He was banned for four hours.

• With respect to the bans imposed for the social media material, the complaint was received by us on Wednesday 5/9, thus it was certainly circulated prior to Friday 7/9, as More have claimed. The matter was discussed with More ticket leaders in our office on the Thursday, and a Deputy RO attended their debrief to warn about the seriousness of the breach.

The ban was increased after the RO and DROs interviewed the person responsible for circulating the material, Lola. Lola admitted that she did not have first hand knowledge of the events that she purported to describe, although the content had clearly been sourced from someone very familiar with the Student Office Bearers. The Returning Officer has ascertained that the material is a wildly inaccurate account of events that remain an ongoing and sensitive HR issue for UMSU. Lola's social media profile indicated that she was friends with numerous members of More. When questioned as to why she had attacked the Socialists and Stand Up, particularly Molly Willmott, including with accusations of racism, she advised that 'I want More to win'. More have claimed that the material was not circulated widely, but this is difficult to

More have claimed that the material was not circulated widely, but this is difficult to determine. Doubt on this matter is the only reason that a more substantial ban was not imposed.

- With respect to the leaflets/posters distributed by Melbourne Socialists, the content was, in our assessment, factually true. A verbal response was given to the complainant that the content had been researched and verified.
- Molly Willmott's penalty for potential violation of the secrecy of the ballot has been inaccurately described. It was initially for four hours and reduced to two as the photography prohibition has been removed from the Regulations. An essay was not given in return for a reduction in penalty.
- With respect to the alleged Plagiarism we were not satisfied this rose to the level of plagiarism, so did not engage in a debate about whether it would be misleading conduct if it was. Academic integrity policy has a different purpose to the election regulations. It could be incorporated in the Regulations, but even if it was, it was not clear this instance would have been judged as such.
- In regard to the disputed ballots, these were set aside, but there were some determined to favour each side, and would only be decisive if all those arguably for More were included and all those for Stand Up excluded. The ballots were set aside for reasons of

practicality in the event of Tribunal review. The Returning Officer had ruled on all of them. The determination of formality is not a negotiation, it is a matter for the Returning Officer and the Tribunal in turn.

- With respect to the Count Room being opened, without direction to do so, by security and left unsupervised: the shift between the original count and the recount was in favour of More on both Welfare and General Secretary, but was well within the margin of usual errors. Likewise the change in total votes and informal votes were well within the usual error, allowing for the addition of provisional votes admitted to the count. It is not clear where tampering may have occurred.
- A margin of 40 votes on Women's Officer is equivalent to one of 80 votes on other positions, and this is very unlikely to have been shifted by bans of an hour and a half.

We regard the violation of polling areas to be a serious offence as it compromises the ability of students to vote in an environment free of undue influence. It also has the potential to compromise the secrecy of the ballot.

The dissemination of material through social media is inherently difficult to police. We regard the circulation of fabricated and defamatory material for political gain to be an unconscionable practice that must be dealt with severely.

Irrespective of whether they affected the outcome, penalties are there for a reason and may, in close contests, make the difference. They would not be effective otherwise.
